## MINISTRY UPDATE FROM PASTOR KELLI GLASGO

Hello CODR Family! I hope your summer has been fun and relaxing. I can't believe it's almost time for school to start. Summer always goes by so quickly! I can't complain though, my family and I have had a great time and made the most of it. I'm actually looking forward to school starting and getting back into more of a routine (don't tell my kids ) ©

The prison ministry has been busy this summer as well. Our weekly service at Rockwell City Prison has continued to grow with new guys showing up as others are being released. We did 4 baptisms and 6 reaffirmations of faith recently so the kingdom is growing! The guys have been stepping up, getting involved in the service and our volunteers have been amazing. I just found out last night that a new batch of volunteers will be having their orientation soon, so that will bring our total volunteers at Rockwell up to around 20! Thank you to everyone who has participated. It means so much to the guys to know they are not forgotten.

I'm also very pleased to report that we were able to get back into the Fort Dodge Prison for worship after a 3 1/2 year absence. Unfortunately at this time they are only letting clergy into the facility so volunteers are not allowed yet, but we're praying that this changes soon. I've also just recently been informed that the prison chaplain has accepted a new position out of state and that until they find a new chaplain, I will not be allowed to go in for services. It's frustrating, but we know God has a plan. Please keep the Fort Dodge Prison in your prayers. Staffing shortages are what's hindering our access, so we pray that new correctional officers are hired and trained soon and that the guys continue to worship on their own.

On the re-entry side, we've continued building partnerships with the good folks down at the Fort Dodge Community Corrections Center (men's halfway house). Soon we'll be able to communicate with men via tablet, prior to their release, to support their re-entry plans. The IDOC is very motivated to partner with local re-entry groups so this part of the ministry is expanding fast.

What we've continued to hear from all the stakeholders in the process is that housing is the biggest concern. Great resources are currently available to support the men's treatment, health care and mental health needs and employment is relatively easy to get in our current job market. Where men struggle most is finding a healthy place to live and forming healthy relationships. When the only available housing is in rundown, crime infested neighborhoods and there is no healthy family support structure, it's only a matter of time until good people, who are trying hard, start to lose hope. We want to fill that gap by providing a safe and supportive living environment for men. It's a big task so we could use your prayers and financial support. Thank you so much for all you do for this ministry. It's making a difference! - Pastor Kelli

# Volunteer Opportunities

### **Connie's Closet**

Men entering the Fort Dodge Community Corrections Center (men's halfway house) after release have next to nothing, so we supply their closet with basic needs such as: Clothing, Shoes, Coats, washcloths, towels, and Hygiene supplies. This level of support requires no special training and is coordinated by a CODR volunteer lead (Connie).

 Currently we are in need of Towels, Washcloths, and men's shorts and sweatpants (XL-3X), Shirts (XL-5X), Belts (all sizes), Shoes (tennis shoes, black dress, non-slip and work boots, socks (6-12 size), Underwear (L-3X), Plastic hangers. Donations can be dropped off at St. Olaf or Grace Lutheran Church in Fort Dodge Ia.

## **Transportation Assistance**

Men reentering society often times do not have access to transportation, so volunteers provide rides to appointments, job interviews, home visits etc. This level of support happens in partnership with AFES (Athletics for Education and Success - Fort Dodge) and does require some training and a DOC background check.
